







MS. NILAMBARI KOLWALKAR INQUIRY BASED LEARNING

Inquiry-based learning is a form of active learning that starts by posing questions, problems or scenarios often assisted by a facilitator—rather than simply presenting established facts or portraying a smooth path to knowledge. Inquiry learning involves developing questions, making observations, doing research to find out what information is already recorded, developing methods for experiments, developing instruments for data collection, collecting, analyzing, and interpreting data, outlining possible explanations and creating predictions for future study. Thus inquiry-based instruction is very closely related to the development and practice of thinking skills.

Some benefits of inquiry-based learning that we can see in the classroom

It helps to reinforce relevant content and improve understanding of core concepts. Study suggests that a brief inquiry activity to start class can help students absorb information throughout the day. It also states that curiosity prepares the brain for learning — allowing students to become more proficient at

understanding and remembering skills and concepts. By asking open questions, taking them through original strategies, empowers students to take ownership of their learning. Students can improve certain skills through inquiry-based learning, many of which relate to initiative and self-direction. Students learn how to ask questions, investigate, discuss, collaborate and reach their own conclusions. Although they can separately build these skills through other activities, selfguided inquiry and analysis synthesizes this development. Inquiry-based learning can also benefit teachers, as activities can be done for almost any classroom, regardless of grade and individual skill levels. This is because you can adapt the pace and content to suit the needs of students.

Running an inquiry-based learning activity will give you a chance to use differentiated instruction strategies, appealing to the diverse learning styles of your students. Students can work by themselves, or as part of a small or large group. Inquiry itself involves methods such as discussion and guided research.

Delivering a range of content and ways to process it, inquiry activities can allow you to meet your students' distinct learning needs and preferences. Armed with a thorough understanding of inquiry-based learning and the strategies you need to run activities, your students should see benefits.

These not only include an improved understanding of curriculum concepts and the development of transferable skills, but — according to research and proponents — a greater appreciation for learning's inherent rewards.

This, in itself, can create a more engaged classroom.

MS. **MADHUBAN GHOSH**INVEST OUALITY IN EARLY YEARS

The first five years of a child form the fundamental building blocks of their future health, happiness, growth, development and learning.

They are like sponge; they will absorb all possible information around them at an amazing speed, which is why it's imperative to create an exciting and challenging environment for them. This is also the time when they will learn appropriate behaviour, boundaries, empathy, how to interact, how to build and maintain social relationships. Unfortunately, many children are missing out on these vital skills because they are not going through the steps needed to learn these behaviours. And one of the main reasons is that technology is replacing human interaction. Playgrounds nowadays are deserted, even at weekends.

Children are choosing the exciting, quick-response video games. It's very difficult for a story book to compete with a video game. But, however exciting a game is, a child will always prefer to have their parents' time. They love stories

narrated by parents particularly if they can be involved in pointing to the illustrations and questioned as to 'what do you think is going to happen next?' This is a great way to improve communication skills and it teaches the child appropriate listening skills too. All those hundreds of questions a child keeps asking, are the moments when a child's brain is developing. Answering those in a satisfactory manner and encouraging them to think further and ask new ones should be a parent's and teacher's aim.

Another factor to keep in mind is how much are we "helping" our child. It is tempting to step in and help them, but we may end up obstructing their learning by taking over. We should offer minimal assistance and let them discover solutions by themselves. At the age of 4 a child knows that they shouldn't be doing something. They will test us out and that's when boundaries need to be secured. But for the child, if they don't get to test the boundaries they don't learn from the experience.

Another important factor in maximizing learning is for the child to get into a routine.

Morning, after-school, and evening routines all require organization skills to run smoothly. Whether it's emptying book bags right after school, picking out school clothes the night before, or going to bed at a certain time, an organized routine teaches kids consistency, which pays off in other spheres of their life.

Modern technology may be getting in the way of our family time, but refocusing attention and energy on our children is all it takes to fix that glitch.

FROM THE **COUNSELLOR'S** DESK

HEAD - COUNSELLING CENTRE

We know we have emotions all day long, whether we are aware of them or not. Surprise! Surprise! So do our children! Young children have a hard time identifying how they are feeling and how to appropriately express these feelings. Many a time, young children will bite or hit out of frustration or have a hard time calming down after they have had an exciting day. This can be very frustrating for parents and early childhood educators, but these situations are all a learning opportunity for young children in how to identify and express their emotions rather than ignore or cover them.

As parents, when we don't have a healthy way of handling emotions ourselves, we have trouble teaching our kids to handle theirs. That is why the change starts with us. Be a role model for your child - show them that having difficult feelings is part of everyday life; show them how to deal with them and make talking to your child about feelings a normal part of your daily routine.

When we teach kids how to recognize their feelings, understand where they come from and learn how to deal with them, we are honing their emotional intelligence, and teaching them the most essential skills for their success in life. Kids who are able to express their feelings are less likely to have meltdowns and temper tantrums. They also have an easier time making friends and getting along with others. Here are some ways we can help our children ride and surf these emotional waves instead of getting tossed around.

·Get into the habit of labeling the feelings you believe your child is experiencing. For example, if your child runs up to you and hugs you as you walk through the door, you can say something like "someone's a happy bunny today!" or if she is throws her arms around and stomps about.

say that you can see she is upset about something, thus paving the way for her to talk about it.
Labeling your child's feelings as they happen helps them to build their feelings vocabulary.

Teach your child that feelings come and go - Our emotions pass through us like waves, building and building until finally they reach their peak, crash, and subside. We can't choose these feelings, but we can decide how we will behave when they arise. We can be curious about them and talk about them, all the while understanding that they won't last forever.

·When you read to your child, discuss how the characters in the story are feeling. If your child is not so much into reading any more, you can do the same while watching a film or a TV programme together. Point out any clues that lets you know what they are feeling, such as facial expressions or behaviors. Then explain to your child why the characters feel the way they do. If your child is able to, let them take a turn identifying how the characters are feeling and why.

·Rupture and repair - Parents are human. We mess up, we say the wrong thing, and sometimes we let our own emotions get in the way. When this happens, we can help our kids a great deal by talking to them about what happened and how we behaved. Explain how you overreacted because you felt angry or afraid. By relaxing and acknowledging your reaction, you are demonstrating how to calm down, a lesson your children can apply when they find themselves in similar situations.

·Praise your child when they use words to express their feelings. Having the self-control to express your feelings appropriately is no easy feat. There are many adults who are unable to do this. When your child tells you how they are feeling instead of having a complete melt down, praise them for doing so. Praising your child for practicing good behavior makes them more likely to do it again in the future. It also lets them know that you are watching them and notice when they do good things.

Sounds simple and doable, no? Remember that children are affected by the feelings, behaviours, and interactions of others. So, it is important to monitor your own wellbeing and ask for help and support when you need it so that you have the energy to be there for your children including showing 'feel good' emotions such as happiness, joy, enthusiasm and excitement

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LAKE NATRON

Lake Natron is a salt and soda lake in Arusha Region in northern Tanzania. The lake is close to the Kenyan border and is in the Gregory Rift, which is the eastern branch of the East African Rift. The lake is within the Lake Natron Basin, a Ramsar Site wetland of international significance. The lake is fed principally by the Southern Ewaso Ng'iro River, which rises in central Kenya, and by mineral-rich hot springs. It is quite shallow, less than three metres (9.8 ft) deep, and varies in width depending on its water level. The lake is a maximum of 57 kilometres (35 mi) long and 22 kilometres (14 mi) wide. The surrounding area receives irregular seasonal rainfall, mainly between December and May totalling 800 millimetres (31 in) per year. Temperatures at the lake are frequently above 40 °C (104 °F). High levels of evaporation have left behind natron (sodium carbonate decahydrate) and trona (sodium sesquicarbonate dihydrate). The alkalinity of the lake can reach a pH of greater than 12. The surrounding bedrock is composed of alkaline, sodiumdominated trachytelavas that were laid down during the Pleistocene period. The lavas have significant amounts of carbonate but very low calcium and magnesium levels. This has allowed the lake to concentrate into a caustic alkaline brine

Storytelling...


